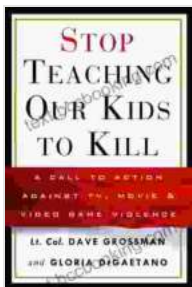

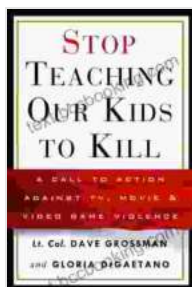

Contact your elected officials and let them know that you support reducing media violence.

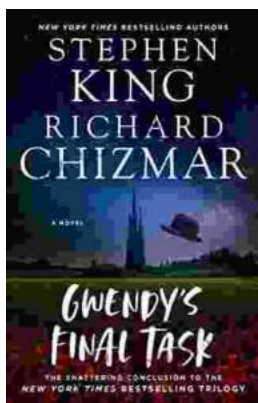
