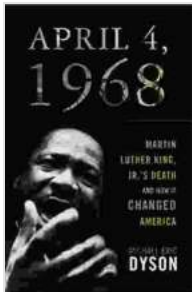

Civil Unrest and the Quest for Justice

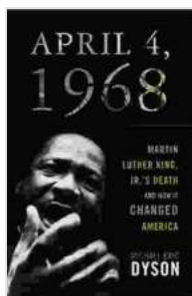

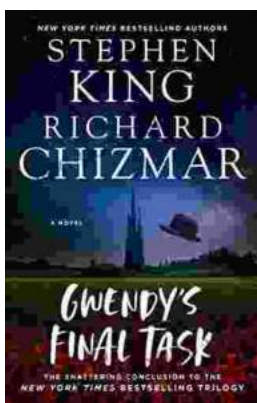
