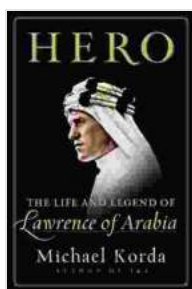

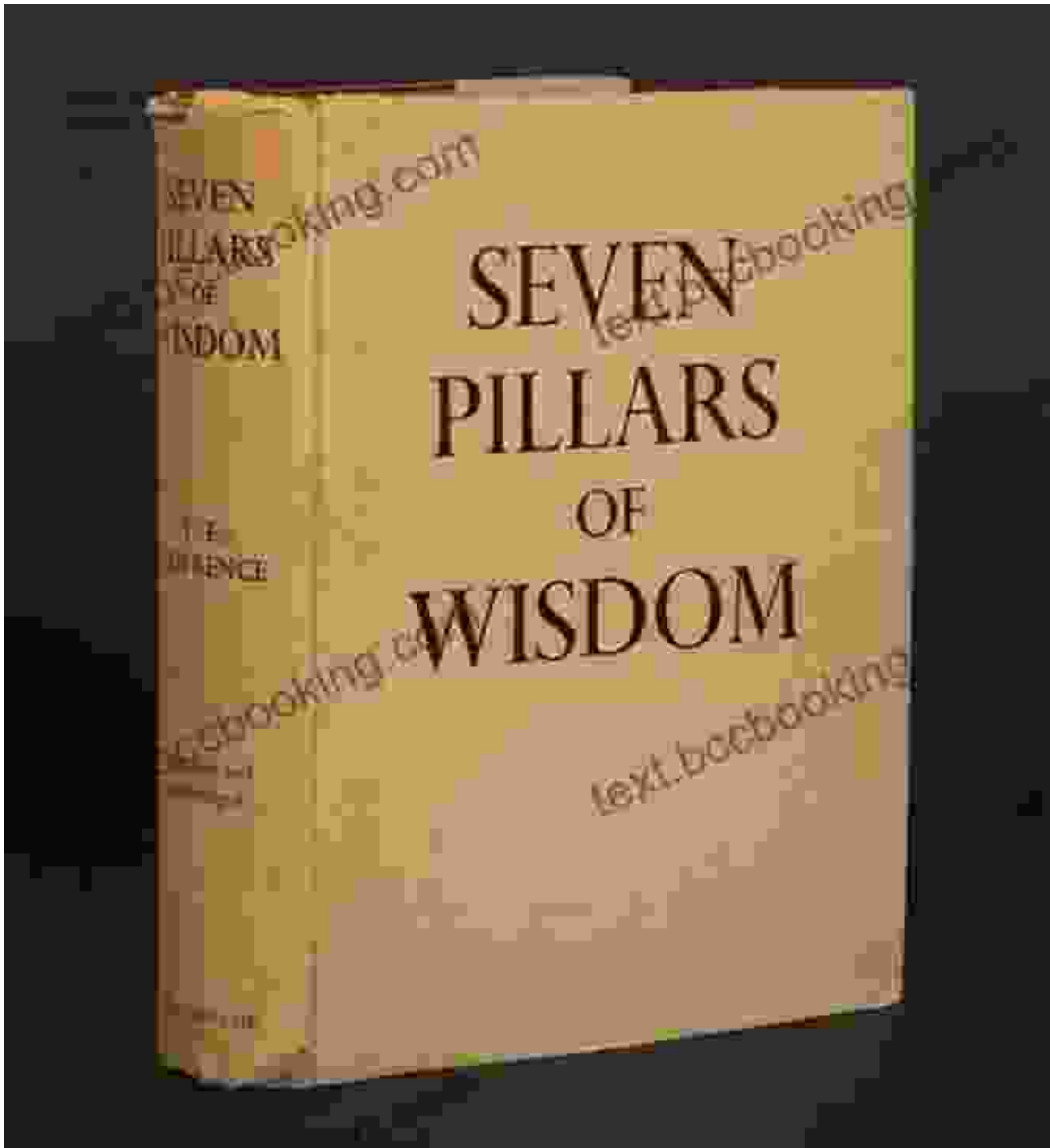

The Seven Pillars of Wisdom by T.E. Lawrence

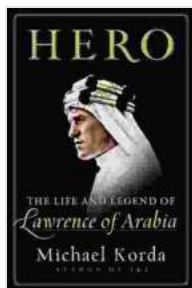
Despite his fame and success, Lawrence struggled to adjust to civilian life. He suffered from depression and self-doubt, and he often clashed with the British establishment.

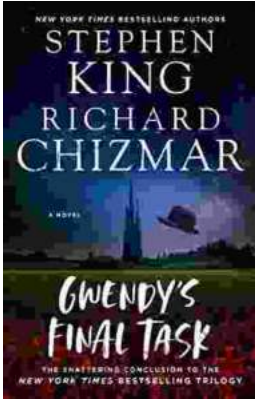
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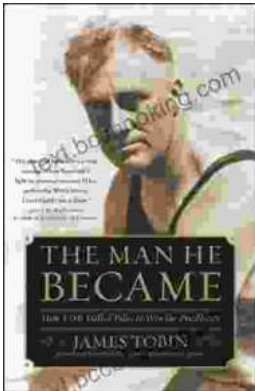
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
