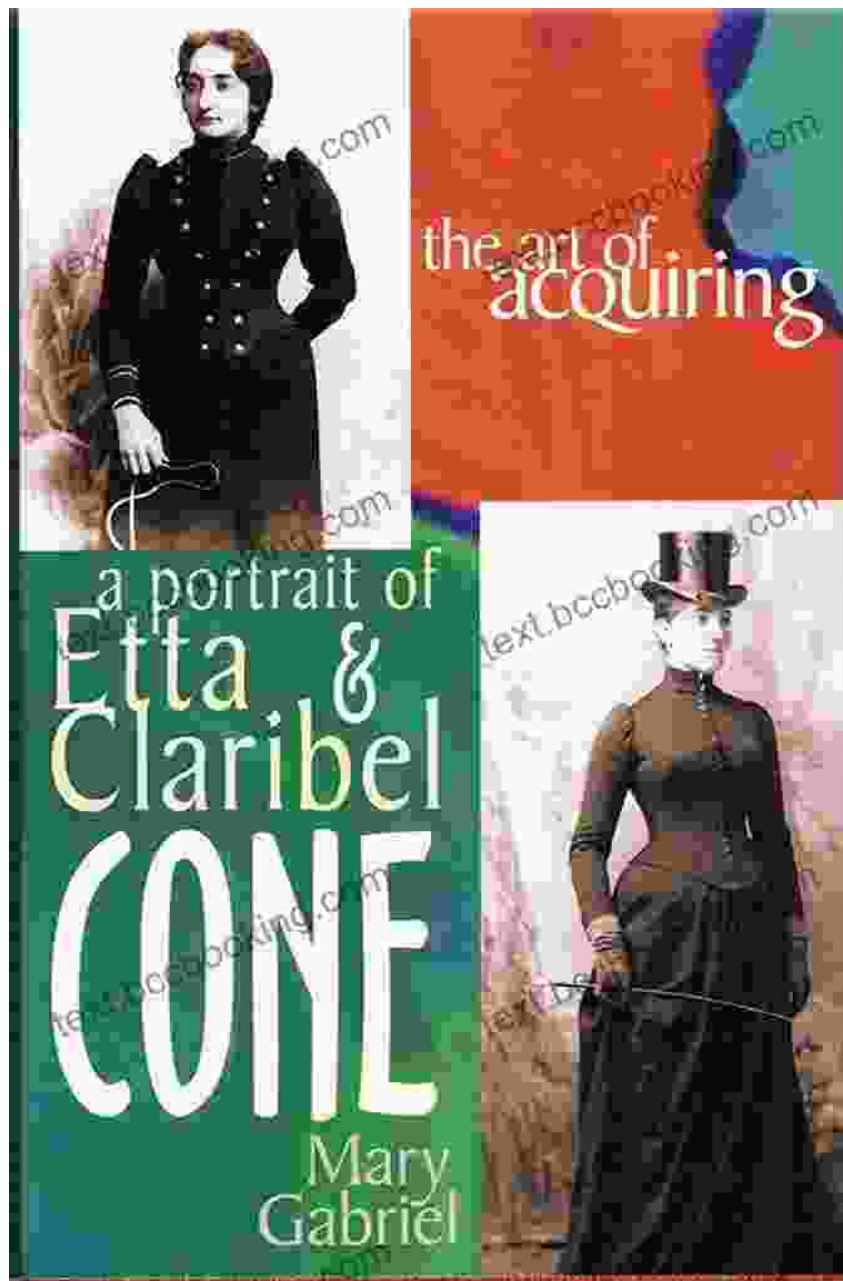
Portrait of Etta and Claribel Cone by Gertrude Stein
